

That night when she got home from work and climbed into the bed, she was thinking about the money and what the lady had written. How could the lady have known how much she and her husband needed it? A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

An exciting part of being a member of the Woman's for the Pacific Islands is being able to share our mission with Christians across the state of Hawai'i. The 194th Aha Pae'Aina that took place on the beautiful grounds of Central Union Church in Honolulu was such an opportunity.

Leading up to the Aha Pae'Aina was the Aha Iki that began on June 8, 2016 where the Association of Hawaiian Evangelical Churches (AHEC) gathered for worship, business and fellowship. All other churches of the United Church of Christ gathered for the Aha Makua following the Aha Iki.

During the Aha Iki, a business meeting was conducted on Wednesday, June 8, 2016 where we elected new officers. William Haole and Violet Makuakane were duly elected Luna Ho'omalu (Chair) and Luna Ho'omalu Hope (Vice Chair) respectively for 2016-2017. Our meetings and especially worship times were filled with joyful singing, and meeting and greeting old and new friends. I met many potential WBM members.

As a new partner of AHEC, our Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands was asked to conduct a tour of Central Union Church and to host a table containing information about our ministry. Under the canopy of Central Union's motto, "Love Never Faileth," in the beautiful sanctuary, Carolyn Winston, former executive director of the WBM and member of Central Union Church, admirably stepped up and shared the connections of the WBM and the women of Central Union Church. Those women saw the critical need for our organization in the 1800s and we have continued to serve the needs of women and children encouraging others to help with our missions in Hawai'i and abroad.

The Aha Makua continued into Friday and Saturday (6/10-11/2016) with an outstanding keynote speaker. The Rev. Karen G. Thompson, Minister for Ecumenical and Interfaith Relations in the Office of the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ, emphasized the message that "we are called to partners." She explained that through building trusting relationships with each other, sharing our common values of a living God and our commitment to justice, defining our expectations of each other and sharing effective communication by choosing to learn about each other, we could work more effectively.

Another important partnership was established when the Presbyterian Church in the Republic of Korea (PROK) signed a document of partnership with our UCC churches. They are very interested in our ministries in Hawai'i. The Rev. Charles Buck pointed out our mission ministry through the WBM.

The Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands is not a force to be ignored. During our "speak out" time where each signed-up speaker is granted one minute to share what they choose, I gathered five dynamic WBM members, each from a different island, to speak out on behalf of our ministry. As diverse as our membership, each told her story about her involvement in our WBM. Each was pertinent, effective and unique in her own way. Mahalo to Alaka'i Paleka from Maui, Lorna Bufil from Hawai'i Island, Linda Shigeta from Kaua'i, and Kahu Napua Burke from Moloka'i. What a fabulous team of women!

Let me conclude my summer experiences with theses words - God will meet all your (our) needs according to the riches of His glory in Christ Jesus.

More and more, I stand in awe of how God provides so overflowingly, so relevantly, so graciously, and so timely. Ever so faithful, He has continually met the needs of the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands through the myriad of gifts and talents of our members, the tremendous support of our partnerships, and in countless ways that we do not possess the capacity to imagine.

Our 145th Annual Meeting and Fellowship held on Saturday, April 30, 2016 at Central Union Church was such an example of how God so beautifully provides for our WBM. The event was an amazing culmination to another year of ministry. With 106 attendees, including a significant number of guests, it was our largest gathering in several years. The transforming and provisional power of God was demonstrated as Dion'e Kaeo-Tomaselli shared how she has continued to rise above the trauma surrounding a wrongful arrest and incarceration for five years out of a ten-year sentence. During this time, she pensively composed 25 original songs. Born with a gift of music and song, Dion'e blessed our gathering as she sang three songs including one that she wrote. She will realize her dream of releasing her first Extended Play (EP) CD on Saturday, October 15, 2016, Carla Houser of the Waikiki Youth Outreach Center (also known as YO) presented a summary of much needed services and resources for our homeless youth and shared how the annual support of our WBM enables YO to more widely do what is needed. We witnessed her compassionate heart as she emotionally spoke about how she searches for our homeless youth when she has not seen them at YO. The Honorable Frances Q.F. Wong expressed her appreciation, once again, for the support God provided through scholarships she received through our Mother Alice Scholarship Fund. After retiring as a senior judge of the O'ahu First Circuit of Hawai'i, she had answered the call to attend seminary. Eve-catching centerpieces made by Emma Garrett, one of our newest members, adorned our tables, Linda Shigeta, Kaua'i Co-VP Representative and Myrtle Stewart-Vetekina, Recording Secretary, were acknowledged for their years of faithful service as they stepped down from their positions after fulfilling their respective terms. God's provision was unmistakable when Rev. Nani Hill and Mililani Byers graciously assumed these roles. Our savory Hawaiian lunch was plentiful and our first silent auction yielded great results. Our program saw no technical difficulties and the staff at Central Union Church where we hold our gathering annually were as congenial as always.

For several years, we have been without a Maui VP Representative, but I am overjoyed to announce that on Friday, August 5, 2016, God answered our prayer. Arlene Kealaonalani Pihana, a member of Kaahumanu Church on Maui, enthusiastically stepped into this role and is eager to begin working. You will learn more about Arlene in this newsletter.

As we mourned, but honored eight of our members who transitioned to eternity with our Heavenly Father, God simultaneously blessed us with 14 new members from O'ahu, Maui, and Hawai'i Island.

I could go on and on about God's magnificent provision for the ministry of our WBM and for me personally. For those times when things may appear daunting or seem like there is no way through, I simply remember that my own life authenticates the truth that He has never failed me.

As we begin yet another new year in this vital ministry, I want to extend my sincere gratitude to all of you for your compassion and dedicated service. Many of you have pressed through illnesses, family matters, juggling schedules and more, to faithfully minister to the many who are hurting and at times, in need of a miracle. As I'm on the front line daily, I can assure you that God is proliferating our efforts and we are clearly making an impact on our islands.

We can truly rest securely in God knowing that He is always present, omniscient, and that His provision is absolutely limitless.

Never underestimate the power of a Christian woman who started a Bible study in her home that got so large that it had to be relocated to the church;



OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

For the past sixteen years Central Union Church has been involved with Operation Christmas Child, the shoebox ministry of Samaritan's Purse, packing shoeboxes with gifts of toys, school supplies, hygiene items, and other necessities for hurting children around the globe. The Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands has participated in this project for the past three years. These gifts are delivered to over one hundred different countries, where they are then hand-distributed to the children, many of whom have never

received a gift of any kind. Some children have never had anything they could call their own, not even a toothbrush or pencil. The shoebox gifts fill a physical need, but equally important is their impact on the emotional, social, and spiritual needs of the child and his/her community. This past Christmas the people of Hawai'i sent 46,705 gift-filled shoeboxes to the Philippines, Mongolia, Indonesia, Bangladesh, and Native Americans.

I make it a habit to include a Christmas card or picture postcard of Hawai'i in every shoebox I pack. On the card I write a very short message (one or two sentences) and give my mailing address. The personal connection ~ a card with my name and address (not just the name of the church) ~ matters at least as much as the gift. Let me share a couple of stories.



I recently received a sweet thank-you message from Jillian, a 9-year-old girl in the Philippines. She included a photo of her and her cousins with their shoebox gifts, and also a photo of the card. The most special thing in the box was the Christmas card with my name and address.



In April I spent a week in New York with Jasmina, who received a shoebox gift from me back in 2000 when she was a ten-year-old fifth-grader in post-war Bosnia. She wrote me a thank-you letter, her first attempt at writing in English. We corresponded for about four years, but lost touch after she graduated from eighth grade. The only address I had for her was her school address. My address had also changed. Four years later she found me on-line! She had come to America on her own and was working as a nanny in New Jersey. We finally met in person in 2009, in New York City. In 2013, I was the maid of honor at her wedding. Now she has a beautiful baby daughter and she considers me one of the grandmothers. While visiting Jasmina, I met her



mother, sister, and grandmother in Bosnia, thanks to modern technology (Skype and FaceTime). Each of them thanked me repeatedly for being in Jasmina's life. Her sister, Azemina, cried as she spoke about how much the shoebox gift had meant to their whole family. It meant that someone cared. Someone far away who didn't even know them. And it gave them hope.

This year, Shoebox Collection Week is November 14-21. I encourage you to start now gathering school supplies (watch for Back-to-School sales in July), bar soap, small toys, toothbrushes, washcloths, and of course shoeboxes. Wrap the shoeboxes (lids wrapped separately, so the box can be opened and inspected for

customs clearance) so they look like actual presents. Yes, appearance matters! Don't forget to include a card with your name.

A wonderful project for individuals, children, and families, Operation Christmas Child is a meaningful, fun, tangible way to make a difference in a child's life.

TRIBUTE AND ALOHA TO LINDA SHIGETA

Linda Shigeta represented Kaua'i at our 145th Annual Meeting and Fellowship on Saturday, April 30, 2016 at Central Union Church to bid aloha to the many friends and sisters in Christ she has known through her service as Kaua'i VP Representative over the past five years. Linda has been a very powerful advocate for the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands on Kaua'i and has been very effective in gaining support for Kaua'i-based mission projects. Four of the most effective projects are the sewing entrepreneurial venture of Marshallese women, the Kaua'i Sacred Day Walk for young adults, the sale of Henry Opukaha'ia books through the Kaua'i Museum, and college scholarships for young adults.

We are so grateful to Linda for being such a valiant, determined, and effective representative from Kaua'i. It is with prayers of thanksgiving that we say good-bye to Linda, at the same time we welcome the Rev. Nani Hill to serve as the new Kaua'i Co-VP Representative. Nani will be teaming with Rev. Phyllis Meighen who continues in her position.

The entrepreneurial sewing venture with Marshallese women, which was begun with start-up funding from our WBM, continues as a business. The focus has shifted from making purses to sewing slips. Slips are much easier and faster to sew and reach a wider market. With this change the project is progressing toward long-term sustainability as a source of income for the women.

This year was the fourth year for the Kaua'i Sacred Day Walk. The pool was expanded to include adults of all ages since we were unable to generate participation from young adults this year. We saw God's hand in this shift, as women of more mature age were given the opportunity to consider their transition into the next life stage (i.e., second career, retirement, advancing elderhood, discernment of God's calling after a life-threatening health challenge, discovering life purpose). We thank the WBM for supporting the shift by allowing us to apply the WBM scholarship for a mature participant.

Gail Lee, moderator of Kapaa UCC, was the beneficiary of the WBM scholarship. She described her experience as life changing, clarifying God's purpose of her life, and propelling her to apply for a graduate degree in human resources. She was so moved by her experience that she would like to make the Kaua'i Sacred Day Walk available to the leadership team at Kapaa UCC. She sees the Day Walk as a life-changing catalyst for transformative change in the church. Thank you, WBM, for following the lead of the Holy Spirit to direct us in ways we would not have imagined.

Linda has also lovingly mentored Leslie Namoa, a young inspiring Christian woman who served on the Youth Committee for the Kaua'i Association for the United Church of Christ. Leslie's service, including her work counseling and assisting traumatized teens made a profound impact on youth island wide. Leslie has now been a member of the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands for two years. She was a wonderfully energetic speaker at our 144th Annual Meeting and Fellowship at Central Union Church last year were she shared the lessons learned during her experience with the Kaua'i Sacred Day Walk and expressed her appreciation for the support that she has received from our WBM.

We give thanks to the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands for its generosity of spirit in supporting the work of the Christ's mission in our islands and beyond.

My passion is to establish stable environments (homes) for teenagers and young children that need direction in their life. I believe that the Lord's blessing is already in motion with my membership in the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands and role as the new Maui VP Representative. I am also eager to gather women here on Maui and abroad, and most of all to help create partnerships.

My desire for our youth, more specifically is to:

- 1. Keep our juveniles here on Maui instead of sending them to Ko'olau.
- 2. Provide enrichment for Fostering Families/Parents who are involved or want to be involved with foster care.
- 3. Focus on "Trauma to Transformation" and to foster spiritual and cultural direction.

FAMILY THANK OFFERING

Our Family Thank Offering Committee, comprised of three members, judiciously reviews requests for emergency financial assistance and approves one-time mission grants to meet special needs of individuals and sometimes families. These one-time mission grants have included assistance with rent delinquencies, security deposits, delinquent utility bills, food, medication and more. Requests for assistance must be made through the WBM office by a pastor or spiritual leader, community advocate, or WBM member. All requests are authenticated by the Executive Director of the WBM through supporting documentation.

This summer, our office has seen a surge in requests for emergency assistance. At times, the needs in our communities seem insurmountable as more and more women, including some with children, find themselves in crisis and unexpected need. Our WBM granted five one-time mission grants totaling \$2400. Recipients of these one-time mission grants include:

- A woman who unexpectedly lost her job and needed assistance with a portion of her rent.

 Update: She has secured some contractual work and is confidently and actively searching for additional work.
- Two women with children who escaped abusive relationships. One of these women is a military veteran. **Update:** Both women are now safe and living lives void of abuse. They also have support through community advocates.
- A young woman who successfully completed a substance abuse program and needed assistance with a security deposit to continue another program in a clean and sober house.

 Update: She has now secured employment as well and remains sober.
- A woman rebounding from a financial crisis needed assistance with a portion of a security deposit.

 Update: She is now working full time and doing well.

Our organization is participating in *Give Aloha, Foodland's Annual Community Matching Gifts Program*. This program honors Foodland's Founder, Maurice J. "Sully" Sullivan, and continues his legacy of giving back to the community.



How It Works

From September 1-30, customers are invited to make donations of up to a cumulative total of \$249 per person, per organization to participating Hawai'i non-profit organizations at checkout. Donations made without a Maika'i Card will not be matched. Individuals must use their own Maika'i Card to make a donation. Foodland and the Western Union Founation will match a portion of each donation.

Matching Gift

The Western Union Foundation has generously donated \$100,000 to add to Foodland's gift of \$250,000 to Hawai'i non-profit organizations participating in Give Aloha this year. Therefore, the total gift that will be given to all participating organizations combined is \$350,000.

How To Donate

- At checkout, present your Maika'i Card and inform the cashier that you would like to make a donation to our organization. If you do not have a Maika'i Card, you may request one. Only one Maika'i account number is allowed per person. Our five digit registration code is 7 8 4 7 1. Your donation will be added to your grocery purchase total. You may give up to \$249 per organization (donations exceeding \$249 will not be matched). The amount you have donated to us and the name of our organization will appear on your receipt.
- ➤ Donations in the form of cash, check or credit card (VISA, MasterCard, American Express, Discover and JTB) will be accepted. Donations must be made payable to Foodland, Sack N Save or Foodland Farms.
- ➤ Donor names will not be released to our organization, so if you would like for us to know of your gift, please contact our WBM office at (808) 791-5647 so that we may properly acknowledge your gift.
- Please do not inform donors that their donation will be matched "dollar for dollar." Foodland and the Western Union will match a portion of their donation.
- Membership dues, fees, tuition and other payments for which goods and services are received in return are not considered "donations"

Are These Contributions Tax Deductible?

These contributions are tax deductible to the full extend of the law. Please save your store receipt for tax purposes since it will be the only record you will have of your donation.

How Matching Gifts Will Be Calculated

Matching gifts will be calculated after the end of the program. Organizations will receive 100% of all customer donations given to their organization, plus their % of Foodland and the Western Union Foundation's \$300,000 matching gift. The portion of the matching gift that each organization will receive will be based on the total dollar amount of customer donations designated to that organization as a % of all customer donations received for all organizations. For example, if total combined customer donations for all participating organizations equal \$1,000,000, and \$10,000 (1% of total) in donations are designated for organization XYZ, then XYZ will receive 1% of \$350,000 or \$3,500 from Foodland and the Western Union Foundation's matching gift in addition to the \$10,000 from customer donations. The total gift to XYZ organization would be \$13,500.

Announcement and Distribution of Gifts

Total gifts to organizations will be announced in October. Checks to organizations will be mailed out by October 31, 2016 and will be made out to the organization's name as printed on the organization's IRS determination letter. Checks to sponsored organizations will be written and sent to their sponsoring organization.
