Ecclesiastical Glossary → Churchspeak

A lot of the words we use in worship are alien; we do not use them anywhere else, carryovers from a day long gone. For seekers who may come to our church with no worship background, they are not helpful. Consider using some newer words that are simpler and more descriptive:

Hymn → Song

(sometimes we use descriptive words for the hymns; is this ever necessary? Words such as *Processional, Recessional, or Of...commitment, service, response*)

Doxology → Song, or Song of Praise

Introit → Entrance song

Invocation → Opening prayer

Prayer of Approach → Opening prayer

Responsory → Responsive reading (although often, if you have "one" and "all" or similar people will figure out that it's responsive)

Offertory → Offering

Antiphonally → old word meaning "side to side" – better to outline it "Left" and "Right" or similar

Sermon → this is a church-only word, although most people know what it means. Sadly, many of the options are just as confusing: *homily, meditation* or just puzzling: *Encounter with the Word,* for example

Creed → Statement of Faith

Benediction → Blessing, or Sending out

Lectionary = series of scripture readings for use in worship

Torah = Hebrew word meaning "the way" but often translated as "the law." Used also to describe the first 5 books of the Hebrew Scriptures

Prophet = someone who speaks for God, **not** someone who predicts the future

Gospel = good news. Usually refers to first 4 books of the New Testament

Synoptic Gospels = Matthew, Mark, and Luke, called "synoptic" because they tell roughly the same story

Church seasons:

Advent – four Sunday *prior to* December 25 (note: sometimes December 24 is the 4th Sunday of Advent, because Christmas Eve is an Eve, meaning evening.

Christmas – begins at midnight December 24, and runs for 12 days.

Epiphany – from Greek meaning "appearance" – from January 6 until Lent

Lent – 40 days, *plus* Sundays, before Easter. Begins with Ash Wednesday

Easter – 50-day season that celebrate the resurrection; date chosen is the first Sunday after the first full-moon after March 21...)

Pentecost – Last day of the Easter Season, always 50 days after Easter ("Pentecost" comes from the Greek word for 50)

Ordinary time – meaning "designated by ordinal numbers" and refers to the non-festival days (mostly the seasons AFTER Pentecost and AFTER the Epiphany)

Creation – some churches observe this on the first 4 Sundays of September (see www.seasonofcreation.com for more information)

A copyright clearance service can make it a lot easier.

- www.hymnsight.ca a great site of free pictures that you can use in Powerpoint presentations; they are designed primarily to be backgrounds for hymn lyrics; includes also great introductions on ways to use Powerpoint in your church, and information about copyright
- <u>www.textweek.com</u> a gazillion resources for each week, based on the Revised Common Lectionary
- <u>www.seasonsonline.ca</u> Seasons of the Spirit is a church resource, again based on the lectionary, that provides worship resources and multi-age learning activities for each week, in ways that tend to engage more senses and involve all ages
- <u>www.wholepeopleofgod.com</u> One of the most popular Christian education curricula is available as an online resource; includes intergenerational worship resources as well as Sunday School material for all ages; cost is based on your average attendance
